

# Oak Park Hospital: Future Still Unclear

**Details of the capacity and role of the proposed new hospital on the site of the old secondary school at Oak Park in Havant are still to be determined.**

The projected hospital, which has been on the drawing board since 2002, was originally proposed by the East Hampshire Primary Care Trust (EHPCT) to be a 120 bed, Community Hospital to replace both the Havant War Memorial and the Emsworth Victoria Cottage hospitals.

In November 2004, the plans were revised and the number of beds reduced to 90. Later that year after a traumatic foreshortened consultation which many readers of The EMS will recall, Emsworth Hospital lost its beds leaving only the 23 at Havant to serve both areas.

During May 2006, the new PCT, the joint East Hampshire, Fareham and Gosport Primary Care Trust (EHF&GPCT) produced a new business plan for a 25 bed Oak Park Hospital under a financial arrangement known as NHS LIFT. The ERA complained to the Emsworth Hospital Steering Group that this proposal did not meet their expectations and would not be acceptable to the residents.

Negotiations for a presentation to an ERA Annual General Meeting eventually resulted in a meeting with representatives of the new PCT, which took place in January 2007. At this meeting, it was confirmed that a 'Teamwork' audit used in a financial recovery plan to close the Emsworth beds was only an incomplete draft document, which was never adopted. It was also confirmed that the auditors did not visit our hospital which is part of the audit procedure and that audit is at present an element of the present capacity plan and hence Oak Park beds.

### Hampshire County Council Health Overview and Scrutiny Committee (HOSC)

Correspondence expressing concern about capacity with the new Hampshire PCT continues. These concerns were copied to the Hampshire HOSC and key councillors on the committee.

Oak Park Hospital and the capacity plan were discussed by the HOSC at its meeting on 27th November where it was reported that a number of questions remained unanswered by the PCT representatives. Specifically, the population figure of 'roughly 100 thousand', which was defined as between 100 and 200 thousand on questioning, was based on the above mentioned 'Teamwork Audit' and used to determine the required capacity. The information is inadequate because

this figure does not include the population of the southern part of East Hants, (Horndean, Rowlands Castle, etc.) which lies within the catchment area of the hospital, neither does it take account of the impending large housing development between Waterlooville and Denmead.

The planned capacity is also by no means clear. In a presentation to the Havant Community Partnership on 27th November, the PCT cited 49 beds, 25 for GP step-up/step-down patients and 24 for elderly mentally infirm (EMI). Between that meeting and the HOSC meeting, the EMI beds had been removed. What alternative provision is being made for these patients?

The PCT have been requested to report on these questions at the HOSC meeting that will take place in July 2008.

### Surplus Land

The site at Oak Park is large and there will be 'surplus' land if such a small facility is built. What plans have the PCT for this land?

- Could it be sold for housing?
- Could it be used for a new health centre for Havant, to replace the existing centre adjacent to the civic offices? There have long been rumours of plans to move the civic offices and sell the very large site for development.

Meanwhile Havant Hospital remains the only GP step-up/step-down facility for Havant, Hayling and Emsworth pending a possible replacement in 2011/12.

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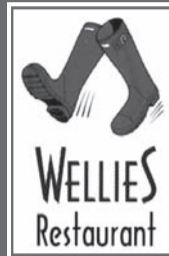
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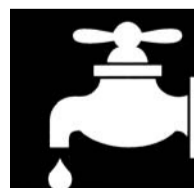
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
